Membership Model Update: A revised draft of the national/state agreement reflecting the terms and conditions of the new membership model as adopted by the House of Delegates has been prepared; input was gathered and incorporated from state leaders on Study Group II. It was approved by the national board for circulation on November 15. Copies of the draft will be pushed out through all state and national leader communications channels and posted to the website shortly.

A working draft of implementing amendments to the NSPE bylaws is also being cleaned up for circulation and will also be pushed out no later than early next week.

Championing the PE License

A Blurry Vision for Safety: NSPE is calling for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to revise its autonomous vehicles guidance to ensure that the process incorporates an impartial third-party who places the public health, safety, and welfare above all other considerations. On November 6, NSPE President Tom Roberts, P.E., F.NSPE, submitted a <u>formal comment</u> to NHTSA in response to the release of the new voluntary guidance, *Automated Driving Systems: A Vision for Safety*.

NSPE recommends a requirement for third-party certification of autonomous vehicles and technologies by someone in the decision chain who has a duty that puts public safety first and overrides competitive pressures (i.e.; a professional engineer). These third parties should be legally obligated to place the public health, safety, and welfare above all other considerations. NSPE further recommends that NHTSA develop and set performance criteria for AV technology. These performance standards can be monitored, evaluated, and/or certified through simulation testing to assist in the development of benchmarking criteria.

In the public comment, Roberts states that "the risks posed by failing to adequately address

public safety protections are too great to ignore. For NHTSA to achieve its mission to 'Save lives, prevent injuries, and reduce economic costs due to road traffic crashes, through education, research, safety standards, and enforcement activity,' these proposed recommendations must be incorporated into the next version, slated for release in 2018."

NSPE encourages states to use the information in this report in newsletters or other updates to their membership to inform members on the activities of NSPE. As a suggestion, it may be most useful to take the bullets of most interest from the transmittal email. The full report (and past reports) can always be found online.

FE Exam Fees Lowered: Beginning January 1, 2018, <u>NCEES</u> is reducing the <u>Fundamentals of Engineering (FE) registration fee</u> by \$50 to \$175. The reduced fee will apply to registrations completed on or after this date; the new price will not be honored for registrations completed before January 1, 2018.

NCEES member boards voted to lower the exam price at the organization's 95th annual meeting in August 2016.

These exams are currently taken by nearly 47,000 examinees throughout the US and 15 foreign locations annually. The computer-based exams are administered throughout the year at Pearson VUE test centers.

STEM Education Panelists Needed: The National Science Foundation is seeking recommendations for membership on the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Education Advisory Panel, established in October by NSF, the Department of Education, NASA, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. The panel was called for in the American Innovation and Competitiveness Act, the latest version of America COMPETES, which became law in early January. The panel is charged with "advising the National Science and Technology Council's Committee on Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics Education (CoSTEM), assessing CoSTEM's progress in carrying out responsibilities related to the America COMPETES Reauthorization Act, and helping to identify need or opportunity to update the Federal STEM Education 5-Year Strategic Plan."
